
The past decade has seen a rise in documentaries, memoirs, and podcasts that revisit the legacies of women wronged by pop culture. With movements like #MeToo and #TimesUp challenging long-standing narratives around female celebrities, it's no surprise so many believe the representation of women in the media has improved.

In her scathingly witty collection of essays, *Girls*, *Interrupted*, Lisa Whittington-Hill argues otherwise. Pop culture's treatment of women, writes Whittington-Hill, is still marked by misogyny and misunderstanding. From the gender bias in celebrity memoir coverage to problematic pop culture portrayals of middle-aged women and the sexist pressure on female pop stars to constantly reinvent themselves, *Girls, Interrupted* critically examines how mainstream media keeps failing women and explores what we can do to fix it. A work of searing relevance, this candid and often cathartic debut marks Whittington-Hill as a cultural critic of the first rank.



H. Nigel Thomas is the author of dozens of essays and thirteen books, comprising novels, poetry, short fiction, and literary criticism. His novels Spirits in the Dark (1993) and Easily Fooled (2015) were shortlisted for the Hugh MacLennan Fiction Award. The French translation of Lives: Whole and Otherwise was a finalist for the Carbet des lycéens award. He has won a number of awards, including, in 2022, the Canada Council John Molson Prize for the Arts.


First published in Canada in 1993, *Spirits in the Dark* is a pioneering intersectional novel of the LGBTQ+ and Caribbean-Canadian experience that was far ahead of its time. This anniversary edition features an introduction by Kaie Kellough and a new afterword by the author.

In his powerful debut, H. Nigel Thomas writes with compelling honesty about the confusing maze of societal pressures that paralyze Jerome Quashee while growing up in the Caribbean, and later on in his adult life. Jerome's intelligence at first promises him a gateway out of the poverty his parents have known, but he must compete with privileged white boys for scholarships in a racist, classist culture. *Spirits in the Dark* is the story of a man who represses his emerging homosexuality, fearing that it will bring his family disgrace as he wrestles with the guilt of knowing so little about his African heritage and the pressure to let go of his ties to Black culture. Under the spiritual guidance of Pointer Francis, he undergoes a religious ritual to block all sensory links to the outside world in order to see clearly into his past and face his demons.





Sheila Kindellan-Sheehan is the author of eleven mystery novels including Where Bodies Fall (2015), In the Shadows (2017), and most recently The Gang of Four (2019). She lives in Pointe-Claire, Quebec.





She is the author of seven books of poetry, four novels for adults, three novels for children, and a work of literary history.

Cathedral/Grove, Susan Glickman's brilliant new collection, comes to terms with the question of legacy—what we leave behind as a species, as citizens, and as parents. Marked by the lucidity and precision she has been celebrated for, the poems encompass the monuments of Western civilization, a climate in decline, and the pandemic. The title is inspired by the fire that ravaged Notre Dame Cathedral in 2019, destroying the wooden roof-frame known as *La Forêt*; it also alludes to "Cathedral Grove," otherwise known as MacMillan Provincial Park, one of the last old growth stands on Vancouver Island. In poems of praise and lament for our fractured world—"Everything is becoming more itself / or something else," she writes—Glickman has tapped into a magnificent vein of lyric richness.







Joe Fiorito



Born in Fort William, Ontario, Joe Fiorito's awards include the National Newspaper Award for Columns, the Bressani Prize for Short Fiction, and the City of Toronto Book Award. He is the author of eight books of fiction and non-fiction, including two collections of poetry, most recently All I Have Learned Is Where I Have Been (2021). He is married and lives in Toronto.

In his third collection of verse, *Quicker Than The Eye*, Joe Fiorito continues to craft short, sharp poems that define the harder edges of urban life. His principal tools are a photographer's eye for detail, and a musician's ear for the sound of the human voice. Now, in *Quicker Than The Eye*, Canada's poet of the streets turns his gaze inward, writing about the influences of early love, family tragedy, and the search for meaning in a world where "the desolate things are mine." A master of spare, razor-sharp language, Fiorito manages to strip sentiment from memory in order to find tenderness and enduring truth on the margins of the city. He has never written more austerely or more beautifully.





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STATES OF EMERGENCY

Yoyo Comay



Yoyo Comay is a poet and musician from Toronto. He released his first EP of original music, Crushed, under the name Sufferin Mall in 2022. His work has appeared in The Peripheral Review, Commo Mag, Touch the Donkey, Metatron Press, and Small Walker Press. He is also a co-founder of the Toronto Experimental Translation Collective. States of Emergency is his first book of poetry.

States of Emergency is a book-length poem about the apocalyptic present, written in a language whose meaning is liquid and full of slippage, always spilling out from its container. In Yoyo Comay's hands, words roil, churn, and surge. By taking on different mood and modes, from the prophetic to the colloquial, he has created a form that is a constant unravelling—a leap of faith into intuitive meaning, a letting go into ongoingness. "I am catapulted into where I am," he writes, "and the air concusses around me." Comay sees poetry as a visceral experience: a state of immanence, embodiment, emergence, emergency. This is poetry as diary and seismograph, an infinite scroll for the end of days. It is a debut like no other.



Horace Brown (1908–1996) wrote for CBC Radio. His novels, published in Canada, England, and the United States, include Murder in the Rough (1946), The Penthouse Murders (1950), and The Corpse Was a Blonde (1950).

Quebec City crime reporter Mary Roberts is about to leave her desk for the day when she receives word that a woman has been struck down in the centre of town. The victim is Renée Brancourt. A former pin-up, she'd once been a big star, treading the boards at the *Comédie-Française*, until her lover, Robert Marchand, plunged over Montmorency Falls. Renée's inability to accept his death led her to be institutionalized.


Now on her deathbed at the Hôtel-Dieu Hospital, the faded vedette tells Mary that Robert's death was no accident. She points an accusing finger at Albert Frédéric, the most respected lawyer in the city, thus setting the young reporter on a trail that will ultimately imperil her own life.

First issued in 1947 by Global Publishing of Pickering, Ontario, *Whispering City* has since become one of the most sought-after Canadian pulp novels. This Ricochet Books edition marks a return to print after seventy-six years.

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

It's 1986, and Muna Heddad is in a bind. After escaping Lebanon's civil war, she'd hoped to work as a French teacher in Montreal, but no one trusts her to teach the language. The only work Muna can get is at a weight-loss centre. All day, she takes calls from people phoning a hotline who are responding to ads seen in magazines or on TV. These strangers all have so much to say once someone shows interest—marriages gone bad, parents dying, isolation, personal inadequacies. Even as her new life faces invisible barriers at every turn, on the phone Muna is privy to the city's deepest secrets.


Following international acclaim for *Niko* (2011) and *The Bleeds* (2018), Nasrallah's intimate new novel, now in its fifth printing, is a vivid elegy to Montreal in the 1980s. 
BECAUSE

Teenage brothers Hombre and Transformer spend their days locked up in their suburban Montreal bedroom, writing songs and dreaming of stardom. Hombre, the younger one, is quiet, contemplative, and talented, a poet in the making. His older brother Transformer is stubborn, domineering, and secretly struggling with mental health issues. Their sequestered world is broken open one summer when their mother hires Spit, a girl from the local guitar shop, to help the boys improve their modest skills. But these good intentions set off a chain reaction with tragic consequences.

Set in the early 80s, in a local music scene brimming with post-punk ethos and a disdain for classic rock, *Because* is a wry and charming depiction of a sibling relationship founded on feverish angst, unspoken admiration, jealousy, and the pursuit of the greatest song they can write from their own room.



Pierre Nepveu Translated by Donald Winkler


The Four-Doored House evokes two key women in Pierre Nepveu's life. First, his granddaughter Lily, who he imagines maturing into a complex world, haunted by her memory of him as he is haunted now by her projected self, navigating an era awash in uncertainty and unease. Imbued with both wonder and disquiet, it is an aging poet's celebration of childhood, as well as a meditation on his own "future absence." There follows his celebration of C, the woman with whom Nepveu shares his nights and days. These are love poems dedicated to a companion who has aided him in finding "new phrases that reformulate the impossible."

WHILE SUPPLIES LAST

Anita Lahey

Anita Lahey writes the kind of rigorously observed, emotionally charged poetry few can match. In *While Supplies Last*, her first collection in eleven years, Lahey throws herself on the mercy of a changing climate, takes refuge in art and revels in everyday wonders. In the final section, about a forest fire that devastated the Cape Breton village of Main-à-dieu in 1976, she becomes a custodian of local histories. No matter the subject, whether traffic reports during the pandemic, a fossilized baby mammoth, or Toronto's iconic Don River, Lahey extends the sense of what language can do and say.

This is tour de force writing: mischievous, unpredictable, urgent, never boring. In *While Supplies Last*, Lahey comes fully into her own.

THE MONTREAL POETRY PRIZE ANTHOLOGY 2022

Founded in 2010, the Montreal International Poetry Prize has established itself as a major event in contemporary poetry, both in Canada and around the world. The 2022 anthology continues the work of its predecessors, building the community of contemporary poetry on the twin principles of aesthetics and accessibility. Under this banner—poetry is for everyone—these poems speak of historic desolation and everyday bravery. Their images grip and hold. Here common experience crystallizes into stanzaic form, lending dignity to life in a ravaged world. From Canada, Australia, the Caribbean, India, Ireland, New Zealand, Romania, Tunisia, the United Kingdom, the United States, and elsewhere, these sixty poems were chosen for the virtue of their speaking to the reader, artfully and clearly. They voice a reality that you will recognize as strangely yours.

Lorna Goodison, winner of the Queen's Gold Medal for Poetry, judged the finalists, selecting the one poem—included here—to take the \$20,000 prize. Entries were juried by Cameron Awkward-Rich, Martin Breul, Heather Christle, Nabina Das, Liz Howard, Joanne Limburg, Conor O'Callaghan, Tanure Ojaide, Michael Prior, Medrie Purdham, Mark Tredinnick, and Rhian Williams.



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I'M CHASING MY OWN THUNDERSTORM BY GABRIELLE BOULIANNE-TREMBLAY

My mom wants to bring me to the village hairdresser. I make a fuss in the car by kicking the back of her seat every two seconds. She doesn't say a word. Angrily looks at me in the rear-view mirror. I'm chasing my own thunderstorm.

I don't want to leave the car. She removes my seatbelt and pulls me out by my overall straps. "Oh, stop being such a nuisance. Don't you want to start off the new year fresh? You're going to have a nice mushroom haircut like every-one else. Otherwise, what kind of impression would that give of us?"


At lunchtime, we head to the hairdresser's, which is in a basement. It's a funny place. When I walk in, the smell of hairspray burns my nostrils. Three chairs, one of which is waiting for me. The chairs in the back are occupied by two women reading magazines with massive round blow dryers covering their heads. It looks like they're going to be abducted by aliens. There's a door at the other end of the room leading to Gisèle the hairdresser's house. On a zebra print shelf, miracle products promise a transformative experience. There's something for everyone's wants, everyone's needs. I open the bottles, charmed by their smells.

There's a poster displaying the newest, most popular haircuts. My mom points to a little blond boy on one of the posters. "Give him a Nick Carter haircut, he'll be cute as all that. I'll come back to pick him up in two to three hours if it isn't a bother. I have to run some errands in town."

I'm stunned that my mom would leave me for so long. At my age, trapped in a chair, three hours is an eternity. She kisses my head before leaving.

The hairdresser has rings on all her fingers which come alive like centipedes. Her rings are silver, in the shape of hearts, arrows, one set with a diamond, another with amethyst, the rest engraved with her children's names. My hair strands are seized, one after the other, between heart and





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arrow. The scissors chomp my hair. I watch the strands fall, my eyes obstructed.

"Don't make that face, little guy. It's going to grow back anyway."

Gisèle goes to get a cigarette from her purse. She sets down her scissors. Lights up. A cloud soon appears above our heads. Gisèle asks one of the other women to open a window. A small guillotine window. When she turns my chair in its direction, I count the number of people passing by outside. We can only see their shoes or their sandals walking past. I imagine that the shoes and sandals are bodiless, the bodies at home resting. We'll never know.

Sometimes when she's in front of me, my nose almost presses up against her large breasts. I try to move my head. She warns me not to move, otherwise my haircut won't be even. When she brings her face close to mine to cut the top, she squints her eyes, closes one, checks if she's done well. She has the intensity of a huntress. She stands for a while in front of my face. Her fingers smell like Alberto mousse and cigarettes. "You look like an angel." I smile at her. I want to count each freckle on her face. I like counting. I ask her how many heartbeats we are given before we die.

"That's a big question for such a little person."

She takes a second to think about it. She looks at the ceiling as though the answer to my question is hidden there.

"I don't know, but when I think about it, it makes my heart pound faster, so let's cool our jets, eh?"

Gisèle keeps a bobby pin between her pursed lips. They're plum coloured and make her skin look green. Probably why people gossip that she's a witch. They say she's a husband thief, a home-wrecker. I can't see any danger because we exchange smiles and conspiratorial looks in the mirror. The other day at church, she sat at the back, alone, at the periphery of everyone's thoughts, almost forgotten. After the communion, my dad went to talk to her. Standing in front of the confessional booth, he tucked a fallen strand of hair behind her ear. She smiled. Her eyes bore into his. My mom always insists that she, and not my dad, bring me to the hair salon.

I look at my hair on the floor. A blond cloud splayed open. Even though I'm having a nice time with the hairdresser, I can sense a feeling of dread creeping in. I feel like I've lost a limb. I have the exact same haircut as the little boy on the poster. I don't look like myself. I look like someone else. I have the same haircut as Nick Carter. I could be his double if the Backstreet Boys ever needed a replacement. Gisèle takes off my black cape with magisterial flare.

"Tada!" I'm not me. I'm someone else. I don't recognize myself in the mirror. I keep touching my hair while she goes to check on the ladies at the back of the salon. She lights another cigarette. I pass my fingers through the few long strands left, then through the shaved area. She flattened my femininity, a forest of trees uniformly cut, leaving only the stumps. From now on, I'll be afraid to wash my hair because I'll have to pass my hands over the coarse short hairs that bristle against my fingers.

"I like your mom and all but you'll have to remind her that I'm not a babysitter," Gisèle tells me. "You can also tell her that she can pay me at the end of the month, that's no problem. It's been a good month, so I'm not stressed." Another two hours of waiting before she comes back. One of the women leaves before my mom returns and another client arrives. I spend the time imagining what the witch's lair looks like upstairs. There are probably men sleeping, victims of her spells. The missing husbands. The casualties of love. I spend two hours daydreaming about the long and radiant hair of the girls in my class and wonder why boys have to keep their hair short. I wish I had Rapunzel hair.

THE BABY MAMMOTH BY ANITA LAHEY

In 2007, the sons of Yuri Khudi, a Nenets reindeer herder, found a nearly intact mammoth carcass on the banks of northern Siberia's Yurebei river. Called Lyuba, after Khudi's wife, she represented, at the time, the most complete fossil of a prehistoric creature ever found. Her discovery is tied to climate-change-induced permafrost melt. The following sonnet is from the sequence I wrote, "Ice-Age Surprise."

Her trunk, curled, enfolds a gale of long-lost terror let loose in tremolo. She thrashes, gasps, writhes with immense cries and roars against the undertow... that slurping, all-consuming down-suck. The bed of the Yuribei bulges. Cracks. Stills its catch. An ice-bound secret pickles in the sediment of her habitat. Instead of ducking spears, swipes from sabre-tooth cats, lumbering into adulthood with the herd, she ferments in soil, acid, time—intact. That mud choked and drowned and made her were. Yet she is: shrivelled to half her heft, transformed, preserved, what's left.





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
